About project

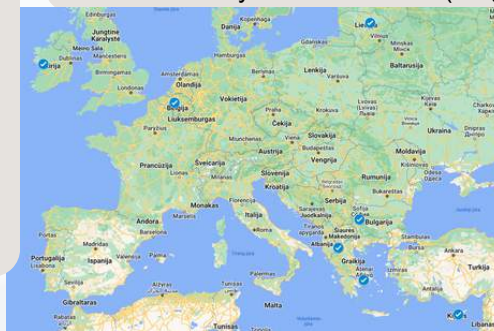
eVeR Safe will address safety skills for autistic persons. The project will design and deliver a software system, attractive to young adults, which will leverage the potential of Virtual Reality (VR) technology to help them deal with emergencies that can occur in everyday life. Through VR, autistic people will face conditions that are outside of their typical daily routine and they will learn the procedures that they will have to follow to control the unexpected situation and cope with it safely.

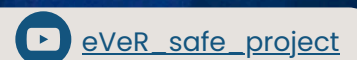
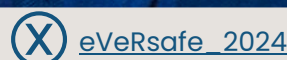
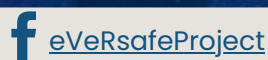
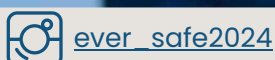
Logo Design Competition
